15 Job Killers Advance in State House

Over 46,500 jobs were lost in Hawaii's economy last year and the trend will get worse if the following bills are passed:

Job Killer 1: HB 2421, which increases the tax on petroleum products from \$0.05 to \$1.05 per barrel.

Job Killer 2: HB 1926 charges businesses \$20 more for a variety of State fees.

Job Killer 3: HB 2370 raises the car rental fee from \$1 to \$4.50 per day.

Job Killer 4: HB 2937 turns health benefits into a collective bargaining issues and removes the Legislature's authority to determine what the State can afford to pay.

Job Killer 5: HB 2874 increases the transient accommodations tax against our visitors industry.

Job Killer 6: HB 2595 makes SOME non-profits pay the general excise tax.

Job Killer 7: HB 1907 takes away net operating loss deductions, itemized deductions and the capital goods excise tax credit for small businesses for two years.

Job Killer 8: HB 2850 increases the tax on liquor by 13 percent.

Job Killer 9: HB 2851 increases taxes on insurance contracts as well as on insurance providers by an unspecified amount.

Job Killer 10: HB 2872 allows for an increase in fees on banks and other financial institutions.

Job Killer 11: HB 2852 makes the insurance premium tax applicable to HMSA, Kaiser and health maintenance organizations.

Job Killer 12: HB 2866 increases taxes on businesses, properties, etc. transferred after to beneficiaries after death.

Job Killer 13: HB 2867 eliminates income tax credits and puts a cap on the remaining credits.

Job Killer 14: HB 2877 replaces certain income tax exemptions with a 1 percent tax.

Job Killer 15: HB 2962 defers the payment of high tech tax credits to Hawaii's high tech companies.

These bills passed through the House and crossed over to the Senate. The total tax increases attached to these bills is over \$400 million.

- **It's the Law:** The census is essential for representative government and mandated in the U.S. Constitution. The more people who don't complete and mail back the 2010 census form by the end of April, the more employees the Census Bureau will need to hire to go door to door to collect the necessary information. For every one percent of mailed out forms that are filled out and returned on time, the government **saves \$85 million**. We called to ask if names and birthdates are mandatory. They are. Census information will not be shared with any local or federal law enforcement agencies. The Justice Department has ruled that the Patriot Act does not supersede the privacy of the census form.

Good News **for Hawaii's Economy**

Tourism increase forecasted

The University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization (UHERO) estimated a 2.9 percent increase in visitor arrivals this year in its March 26 report.

More direct flights to the state

Continental Airlines added and Allegiant Air will add more direct flights to and from Hawaii this year. Continental Airlines added flights between Orange County and Los Angeles, California. Allegiant Air plans to buy six Boeing 757s in order to have the capability to fly to Hawaii. These are part of the over 500,000 new airline seats to be added to Hawaii throughout 2010.

Tax credits for more local jobs

More than 3,660 jobs for Hawaii residents were created by 22 film and TV productions that benefitted from \$16.2 million in tax credits, far exceeding the \$120 million spent.

Hawaii businesses awarded \$30 million

The Navy awarded \$30 million of clean-up contracts to four local small businesses: CKY, EATC JV, WCP-Zapata JV and FOPC. The contracts involve cleaning sites in Oahu, Guam, Japan and Diego Garcia.

March House Resolutions

Rep. Ward introduced the following House Resolutions this month:

HR 230: Requests Kamehameha Schools/Bishop Estate to keep Kamilo Nui Valley in agricultural land use and to establish affordable lease rents to allow farmers to continue producing agricultural crops and protecting established watersheds.

HR 175: Urges the Dept. of Land and Natural Resources to adopt administrative rules that would re-zone Maunaloa Bay and demarcate the zones more visibly to improve safety.

HR 161: Urges the Dept. of Transportation to make top priority projects the installation of 1) a **left-turn-only lane on Kalaniana'ole Highway Koko Head-bound into the Koko Marina Shopping Center** and 2) a second right-turn lane from Lunalilo Home Road Ewa-bound onto Kalaniana'ole Highway.

HR 228: Requests the establishment of a Hawaii "APEC 2011 Strategic Planning Commission" to facilitate the November 2011 APEC Conference to be held in Honolulu.

HR 229: Encourages cellular phone carriers to implement one-way charges for calls on their networks.

HR 237: Encourages Peace Corps Washington to reopen Peace Corps East Timor, where Rep. Ward was former country director.

HR 162: Encourages the U.S. Military to establish and promote Hawaii as a premier rest and recreation destination for active duty personnel.
